Mr. Mims and the staff from the Archives have done a very thorough study of the best method of preserving county records and have made a recommendation to the counties, including Greenville County, for record preservation and accessibility. He asked the support of the Genealogical Society, Greenville Chapter in recommending to the county authorities that the Archives plan be adopted. We have asked Mr. Mims to give us a summary of his presentation to publish in a future NEWSLETTER.

Harold Atwood and his Refreshment Committee are again to be commended for the delightful refreshments. During the fellowship period those attending enjoyed browsing through the items on display for the "Show and Tell."

The following family information sheet was delivered to those attending the DAVIS Family Reunion June 29, 1952, (Submitted by Mr. W. A. Adams.)

THE FAMILY HISTORY OF ALERI D.W. AND HANNAH R. WILLIAMS DAVIS

Everyone here is more or less familiar with the history of the early day settlement of this state. One of the early settlements was the Waxhaw settlement which included York, Lancaster, and Chester Counties, South Carolina and Metklenburg (Formerly Anson County) County, North Carolina. In these counties we find the names Williams, Brown, Nicholas, Holines, Burns, McCorkle and Hyatt.

Some of these families no doubt came from Scotch-Irish An estry from N. Ireland to the American colonies.

From traditional family history the first known ancestor of our family was Robert Davis. He came from Virginia to Chester. S.C. He married Miss Jane Gaston. So far, we do not know their birth dates. The known names of their children are as follows:

William L. went to Memphis Tennessee.

Thomas went to Georgia

John II married Miss Johnson went to Umon, S.C.

James went to Louisiana

Caston went to Lave Springs, Ga.

Ludosia married a Botnes, went to Honey Grove, Texas

Jane married a Borns went to Ladonia, Texas

Jane married a Borns went to Illinois.

Affred W. married Hannah Williams, went to Union, S.C.

The last named one, Alfred W. Davis, was our foretather.

Robert and Jane settled on Brown's Creek, Umon District, S.C. The earliest land purchase found of Robert's was in 1796.

Several of the Gaston families settled at Cedar Shoals and Fishing Creek near the Catawba River in Lancaster and Chester Counties. We know not the relation of Jane to any of these Gaston Families.

Robert and Jane sold 215 acres on Brown's Creek to Thomas Hyatt Jan. 23, 1836. Robert and Jane with their son Gaston went to Cave Springs, Ga. Two of their daughters, Jemima, who married a Davis, and Eudosia, who married Warren Holmes, left Cedar Town, Georgia which was a few miles from Cave Springs, Ga., went to Texas about 1856. About this time Eudosia's son, Henry Holmes, horn Oct. 5, 1847, was nine years of age. The Holmes family and Jemima Davis and her son, Thomas R. Davis, are at rest in Denison. Toxas cemeteries.

Henry Holmes was a member of the Baptist Church, He mar ried Miss Emma Wood, Oct. 20, 1867. They made their home at Honey Grove, Texas.

John Williams, born April 12, 1762 and died Aug. 15, 1822. He married Marget ?, born May 18, 1768 and died Dec. 15, 1827. They reared their family of eleven children in Union District, S.C. John and Marget's children were:
