GENEALOGICAL, HISTORICAL BOOKS

AN INDEX TO THE DEEDS OF THE PROVINCE AND STATE OF S.C., 1719-1785, and CHARLESTON DIST., 1785-1800, by Silas I mmetal Lucas, 3.1, and Brent Holcomb, \$37.50, Puls 1977, Reprinted Sept. 1980, 848, pages. ISBN 0-89308-035-4. The Charleston Deeds began in 4719, the year that S.C. became a Royal Province, rather than a Proprietury one. The deeds prior to 1719 are in a different series at the \$34. Archives. The Charleston deeds COVER THE ENTIRE STATE from 1719-to 1785, at which latter date the counties began recording their own deeds. This index is a copy of the one in the Register of Mesne Conveyance Office, Charleston, S.C. The deeds from 4785 to 1800 are those for Charleston District

ADAIR HISTORY AND GENEALOGY, by Dr. James Barnett Adair, \$25,00, 1924. Reprinted 1978, 408 pages, index, illus, ISBN 0-89308-086-1. This book deals with Thomas Adair, born 1680 in County Antrin, Ireland, who with his family came to Vennsylvania in 1730. Between 1750-1755. Thomas Adair and his three sons moved to Duncan's Creek in 96 District, now Laurens County, S.C. Frafuse Latringiven on the descendants of the three sons, viz: Tames whose descendants are in Ark, and Okla.; Joseph whose descendants are in Ala., Ga., S.C., and Tenn., and William whose family intoved into Ky, from Waxhaw Colony in S.C. Lamilies descended from this family are: Dillard, Pitts, Biggs, Little, Anderson, Cope Land, Linney, Glemor, Nahors and King in S.C.; Bailey, Anderson, Hine, Logan, Bell, Ardin and Monroe in Afa.; and Adair, Smith and Stokes in Obio, plus many other names too numerous to list.

7500 MARRIAGES FROM OLD 96 and ABBEVILLE DISTRICT, S.C., 1774-1890, by Farry Pursley, \$22.50, Published 1980, 325 pages. The product of some fifteen years of research, this volume will contain some it not atost, of the 1750 marriages in the other volume of Old 96 %; riages by the editor. These marriage records have been taken from the edicidual files and packets in the Abbeville Courthouse, and from copies of legal records for Old 96 on deposit in the S.C. Archives, as well as from the newspaper notices in early local papers. All sources are cited as that the researcher may document his work. Since Vital Records were not kept in S.C. intritthe 20th century, this book becomes a very valuational for research in this area.
