

FROM HERE AND THERE

Volume VI of The Colonial Records of North Carolina [Second Series] is now available. North Carolina Higher-Court Minutes, 1724-1730, the latest addition to the series begun in 1963 and published by the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources. Division of Archives and History, completes publication of minutes of the colony's higher courts through the period of transition from proprietary to royal rule. The volume consists of transcriptions of extant minutes of the General Court, Court of Chancery, and Court of Vice Admiralty and, like previous volumes in the series, contains a complete index. The editor's introduction discusses in detail the historical background of the period as well as the colonial court system.

Court minutes are an important primary source for genealogical research. As do its predecessors, volume VI presents a wealth of information about political, economic, and social life in the early days of North Carolina history. Names, of course, abound in such a source. The records are indexed by personal name, place name, court case, and subject. Genealogy stated in a review of one of the previous volumes that "a superb index makes this volume of great use to genealogists interested in a period where records are sount."
