Norris School

The history of the Norris School dates back to the middle of the nineteenth century when it was called Johnson's Chapel. The community was known then as Bowen's Siding.

Near the close of the century, the South Railroad Company built a freight and passenger depot there, and named the station "Norris" in honor of Colonel D. K. Norris, the Founder of the Norris Cotton Mill. A village was soon incorporated bearing this name, thus Johnson's Chapel became Norris School.

During the Century the school progressed from a one-room frame building to a tworoom, and thence to the present modern brick structure.

Some of the Country's prominent educators have been teachers in the school.

Among those who have served as principals are, Miss Mary Grice, Noah Hendricks, Miss Maggie Lewis, Miss Myrtie Boroughs, Dr. Joel Bowen, John O. Hicks, W. T. Earle, R. T. Hallum, W.E. Dendy, Petree, L. E. Kirby, Miss E. Wilson, Colonel Joe M. Robertson, W. E. Myers, S. E. Burnett, W. F. Welborn and C. C. Buroughs.

Liberty's Reunion School Revived as Church



The former Reunion School in Liberty is home to New Testament Fellowship Church. The onetime schoolhouse, across the road from the Vulcan Materials quarry, has been a house of worship for nearly two decades.

It's unclear when Reunion School was first founded.

A January 1903 report in Pickens newspaper *The People's Journal* said the Reunion school house near Beverly Granite Works burned. But the story added, "For some reason, the school had been discontinued," so it may not have been in active use at the time.

In 1915, trustees of the Reunion School District — there was no consolidated Pickens County school district at the time and many schools were their own district — were authorized to issue bonds of up to \$2,500 to purchase a lot and build and equip a new school, according to a March 1915 report in the *Pickens Sentinel*.

An August 1916 report of a "Reunion Rally Day" remarked on the "handsome new school building" where the festivities were held.

Trustees began soliciting plans for a new building in 1937, wrote Julia Jean Woodson and G. Anne Sheriff in *Liberty, South Carolina: One Hundred Years 1876-1976*.

The school was closed in fall 1958 and classes consolidated with Liberty Elementary, which had opened two years before.

No record of the school has been located for the next four decades until Bishop Daniel Galloway of New Testament Fellowship Church came on the scene in the mid-1990s.

The Pendleton native and active pastor arrived to help another church that was operating in the building.

"They were about to lose it," he said.

He ended up purchasing the building and 3.9-acre property at 2574 Greenville Hwy for \$38,000, according to county property records. The previous owners were four individuals, three of whom were siblings from the Pearce family of Laurens, and all of whom have since died.

New Testament Fellowship continues to hold services for about 30 congregants in the building under the direction of Galloway and local pastor Lottie Cabbagestalk.

"We've done an extensive amount of work on that property," Galloway said. "What I'm doing now is really small compared to what we're trying to do."

The 6,000-square-foot, one-story building holds a sanctuary, fellowship hall, kitchen and offices.

General Anderson's Grave

(It is Unmarked and Overgrown with Briars – A Disappointment – A Reproach)

Broyles, May 3. I met with a painful disappointment when I journeyed the other day to General Robert Anderson's old home on the Seneca River, to see his grave. I had heard that a number of graves there were marked, but the only tombstone on the neglected and desolate spot stands at the grave of a traveler who was drowned there in in the spring of 1819. Notice of this incident may be seen in an old file of the *Pendleton Messenger*, now in the possession of Mr. C.C. Langston, of the *Intelligencer*.

Died Saturday last Mr. David Craig, a young man about 21 years of age, from Orange County, NC, in attempting to swim his horse across Keowee River at General Anderson's Ferry, was drowned. On Sunday, the body was found and interred. 8 May 1807, Pendleton Messenger

There seems to be a dozen or so graves in the family burying ground, a small unenclosed spot, overgrown with briars and stunted post-oak and wild cherry trees. A plantation fire had broken out a few days before I was there, and had swept the spot clean—a rebuke, as it were, to forgetful hands. The grave-yard, in the midst of a large cleared area, stands on the inner border of a semi-circular table land or "second bottom," rising abruptly some ten feet above the big bottom low-land next the river, and is, say, three hundred yards north of the spot where the dwelling stands. Not far away is the slaves' burying ground. Gen. Anderson's residence stands on the edge of the same elevation, where it closes in upon the river, and within two hundred yards of the stream. Fronting the house, or where it used to stand, for the fire-fiend devoured it soon after the war, is a strip of eighty acres of surpassingly rich bottom land which in the long ago was covered with maple trees.

The old house stood north and south, and must have been sixty feet long, judging from the piles of stone and brick-bats where the chimneys stood. Struggling through one of these piles is the old-time fig bush that hugged the ancestral chimney corners. An overhanging yearling walnut tree had dropped its last year's fruit among the stones and bricks, some of which I fished out and cracked and ate, and mused away while my friend, Routh, entertaining the man living in a recently constructed house in the old yard with a discussion of seed corn, or admired the Jersey red pig penned up on the spot where the other chimney stood.

Gen. Anderson settled upon the river soon after the Revolution, coming, no doubt, with his long time friend, Gen. Pickens, from Abbeville. He was a native of Augusta County, Virginia, and came from there to South Carolina with Andrew Pickens many years before the Revolution and in his young manhood. General Pickens settled on the east side of the Seneca, and nearly opposite General Anderson, his place being known as Hopewell. They were not related by blood, it seems, but were kindred spirits, and together took the lead in establishing and building the Stone Church and both served the church as Ruling Elders.

As part of the Hartwell Dam project, the cemetery was moved to Old Stone Church Cemetery. The only marker is a government military marker to Robert Anderson.

Who were Silas Andrew Corn's parents?

Originally it was thought that Adam Corn and Hannah Heatherly Corn were Silas Andrew's parents, but other than listed in rewritten genealogies, there is no proof. Currently, Silas Andrew Corn's descendants believe that Peter "Lot" Corn may be Silas Andrew's father. Adam and Peter Corn are brothers and children of John Peter Corn and Elizabeth Parr Corn from Virginia. "Find a Grave" has Peter and Mary Ann Jones Corn being the parents of Silas Andrew Corn. Queries & Questions

Need information regarding my 4th Grandfather, Charles Travis. Our goal is to find out who Charles Travis parents are, if there are any marriage records and possibly the last name of his wife Mary who was born between 1771 and 1774 in South Carolina, according to census records in Ohio & Daviess County, KY. Additionally, Mary (Unknown last name) and Charles had three of their five children in the 1790's in SC.

Charles Travis died in Ohio County, KY in 1804. He was a Captain in the militia in Hardin/Ohio County from 1799/1804. Prior to that he lived in Pendleton District, SC. The SC state archives have him purchasing two land grants.

Land Grant 1: Charles Travis. Plat for 143 acres on Twenty Three Mile Creek, Ninety Six District, Surveyed by John Clarke Kilpatrick for James Jordin on September 21, 1786. We believe he had sold prior to moving to KY around 1798.

Land Grant 2: Charles Travis. Plat for 220 Acres on Keowee River, Ninety Six District, Surveyed by Robert Anderson for Elisha Maxwell on January 4, 1787.

He received a land grant from Governor Moultrie in 1793. Thomas Stribling loaned him \$200 for one of his land grants in 1793.

After Charles Travis death (Ohio County, KY 1804) in 1806 Thomas & Elizabeth Stribling (Pendleton District) sold to Caleb Baldwin on 23 Mile Creek at mouth of first branch below the mill of Calen Baldwin, bounding grant of Charles Travis, Stribling, Elizabeth Stribling. Witnesses: J. Haile, Edward T. McClure, H. McCray, Tate. Tate made oath to Obadiah Trimmer, 27 Dec 1806. Elizabeth Stribling released dower to Obadiah Trimmer on 28 Dec 1803 Recorded 29 Jan 1804

Additionally, in Wilkes County, GA lived Jacob McLendon (also spelled McClendon) & his wife Martha Travis (born approximately 1735, we believe to be the aunt or sister of Charles Travis). Martha Travis is the daughter of John Travis of NC, born 1715.

Jacob McLendon & Martha Travis had a son - Isaac McLendon.
Isaac McLendon married Elizabeth Stribling, daughter of Francis Stribling, brother of Thomas Stribling (Pendleton County, SC).

So we know there was a relationship between the Travis/McLendon/Stribling families. Our research is complete for KY, but SC has proven to be difficult pinning down exact family members. Also, we are coming up with DNA matches to Stribling/Mclendon/Travis ancestors.
